

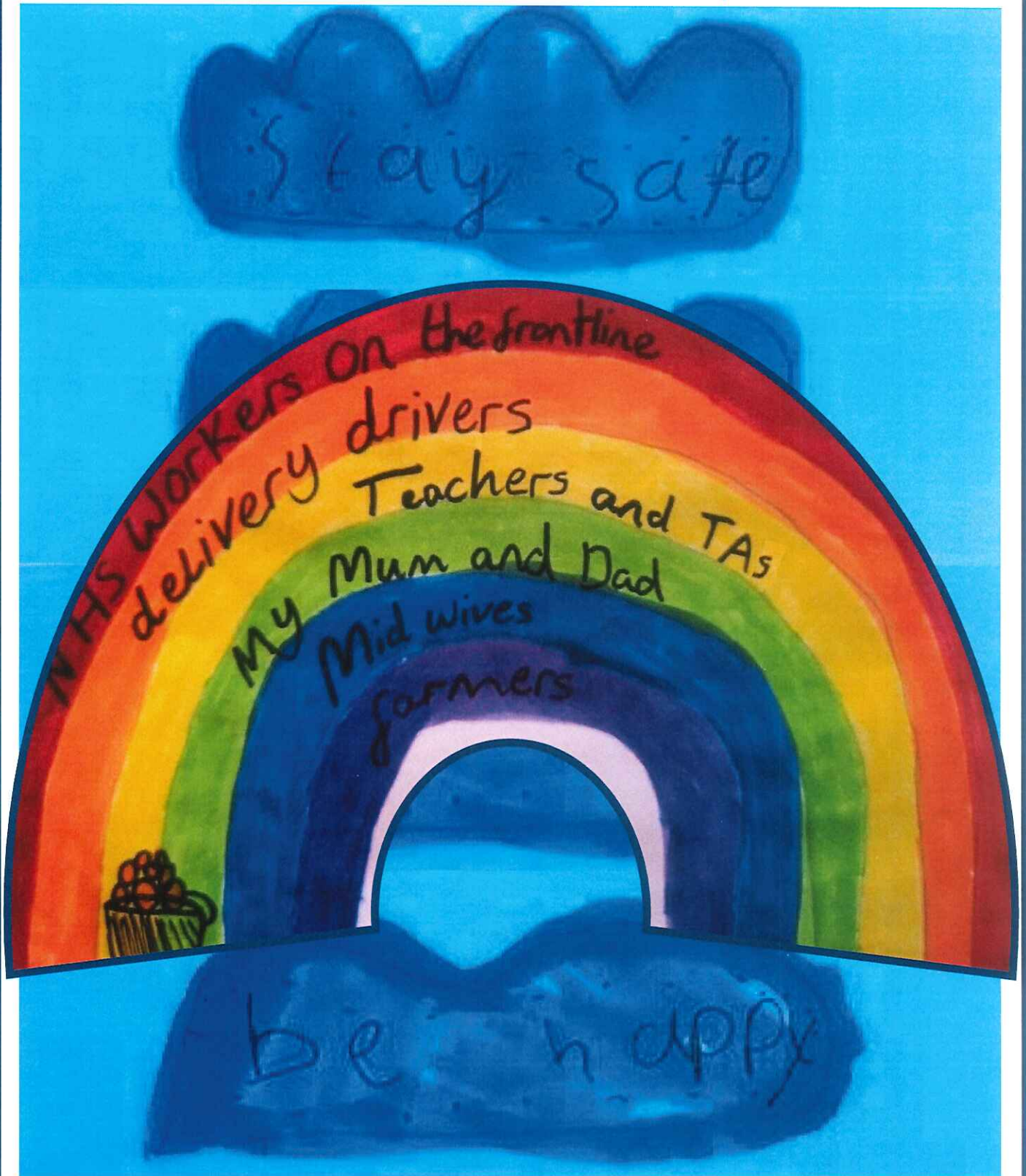

We have been focussing on numbers 10-20 so we have done lots of fun maths activities to help us.

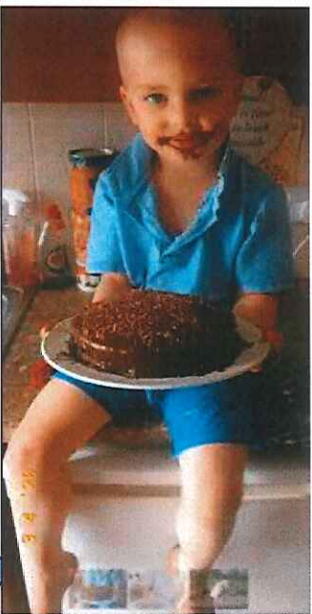

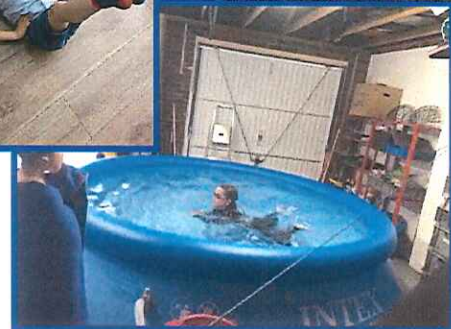

During these unusual times, Year 1 have been busy making sure we keep our skills and learn new ones whilst still having fun.

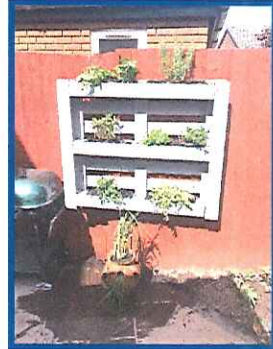
We have made the most of the opportunity to keep fit in inventive ways. Evie even received two medals for running two 10k runs during the Lockdown period; well done, Evie!



We have also spent some time in nature. Within their home packs, the children have completed bug hunts and have found many ways to show me that they are appreciating the natural world.

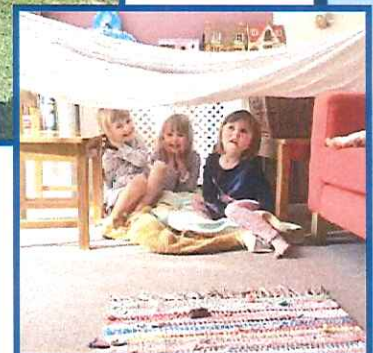
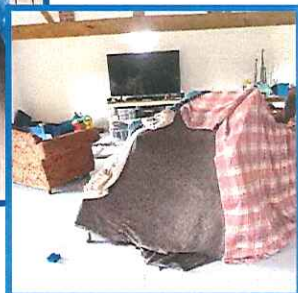
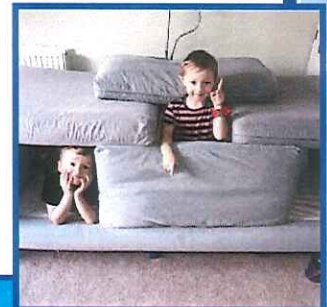


As spring turned into summer, lots of the children have turned their hands to gardening. It was great seeing the update photographs as the plants grew.

One of the challenges that the children completed during home learning was to make a den and send in a photograph of it. We had lots of responses. Here are a few of the amazing dens:

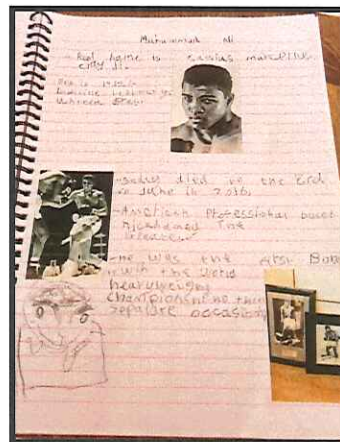
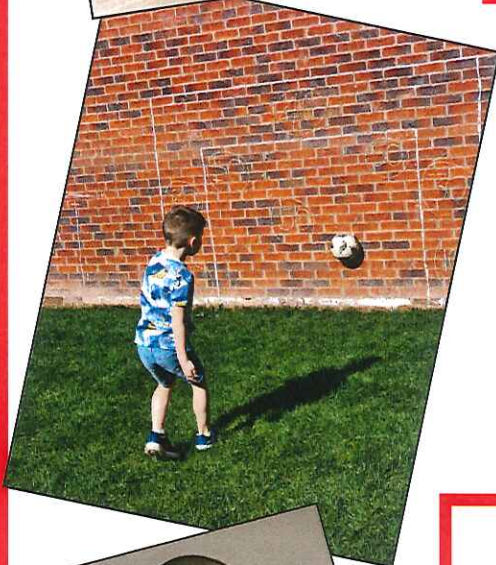
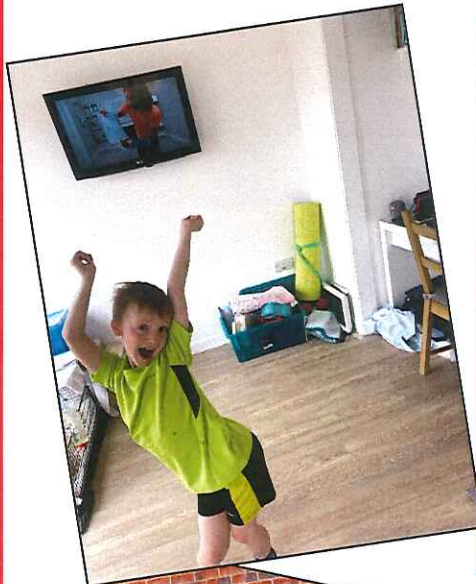


Year 2 Lockdown Learning

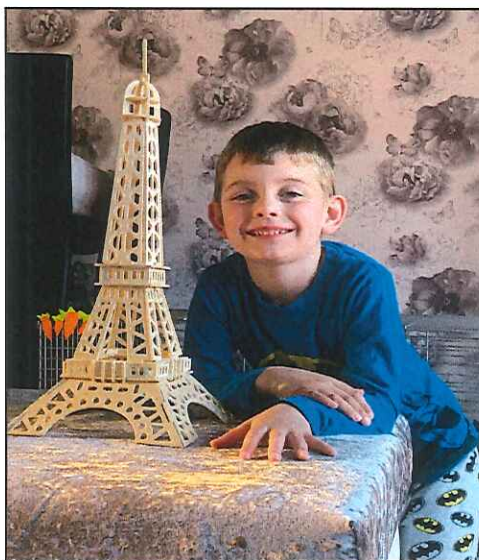
We all became chefs in lockdown!

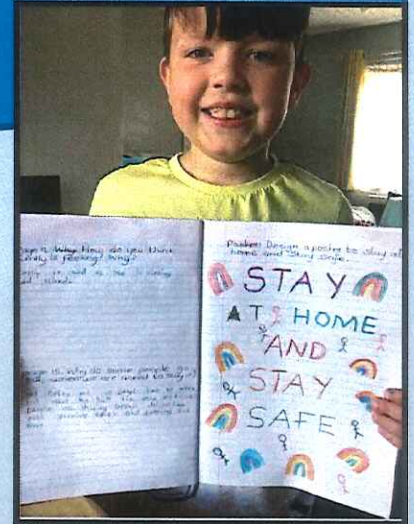

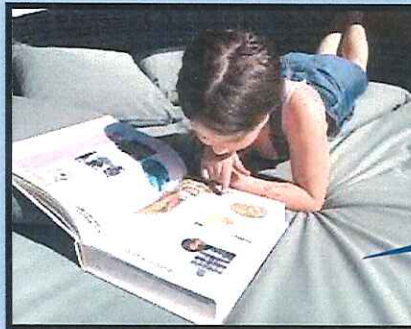

Our Value is Love. We created a display in class to show how we show love to others. We wrote our own tsunami facts sheets and typed them up using 'Word'.

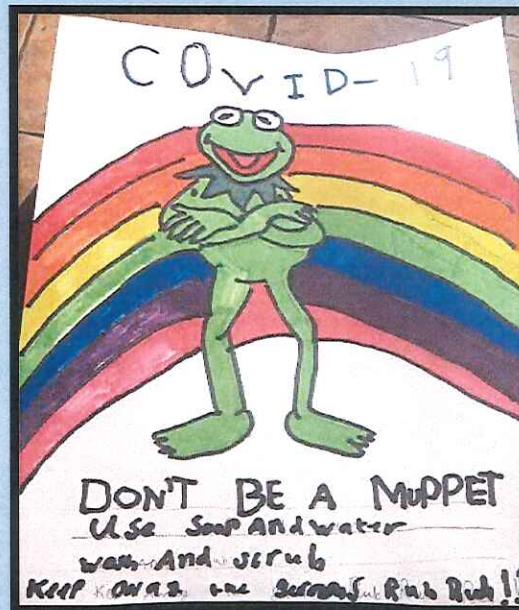
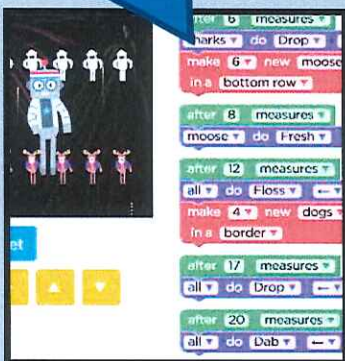
We are getting proficient at using bullet points!

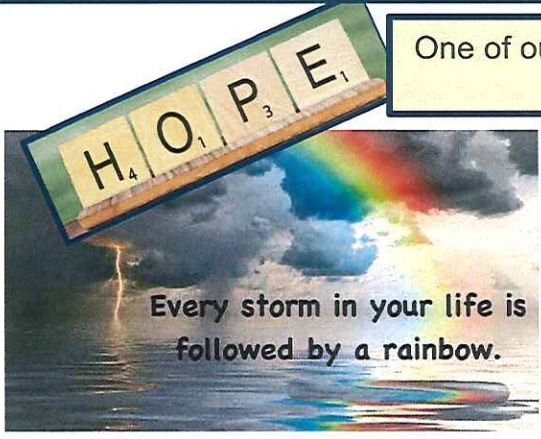

Learning at school: Before Lockdown

Science:

Before Lockdown, Year 6 enjoyed a trip to Bristol to visit 'We The Curious'. They had an amazing time exploring the exhibits and taking part in a workshop about light. They discovered how lighting in shops helps to make the colour of clothes appear brighter, thus more attractive to the buyer; how light can be used to discover real and fake money; and how laser beams can be used to detect motion. Year 6 were then challenged to use all this knowledge to solve a series of clues to be able to break into a highly secured area and steal a bar of gold!

Maths:

The children enjoyed some refreshing maths lessons exploring ratio. They created their own recipes for 'mocktails' and then had to adapt them to make the same delicious drinks but in a range of different volumes depending on various glass sizes. The results were mouth-watering!

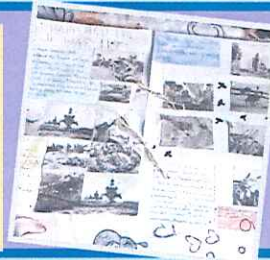
Learning at home: During Lockdown

History:

One of the first home learning projects Year 6 enjoyed during Lockdown focussed on World War 2, a topic they were keen to sink their teeth into. Some amazing double-page spreads were created to highlight their research: ration books were made, ration recipes baked and some Anderson Shelters were even built. The children made excellent links to current affairs, comparing what everyday life was like during the war.

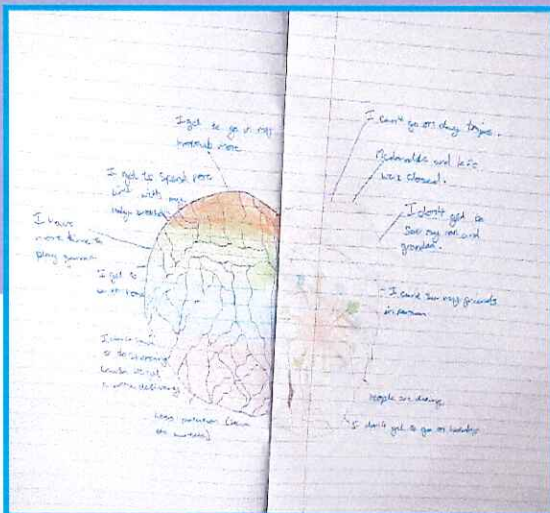
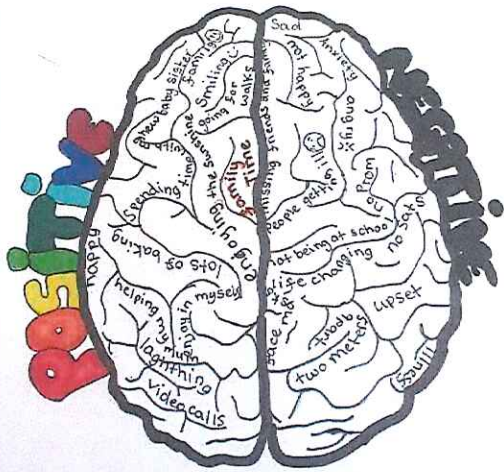


Inside Out Scheme:

When Year 6 returned to school on Friday 5th June, Mrs OJ launched an Inside Out themed PHSE scheme which could be followed outside of school. Year 6 have created some fantastic pieces of work based on the concept of emotions.

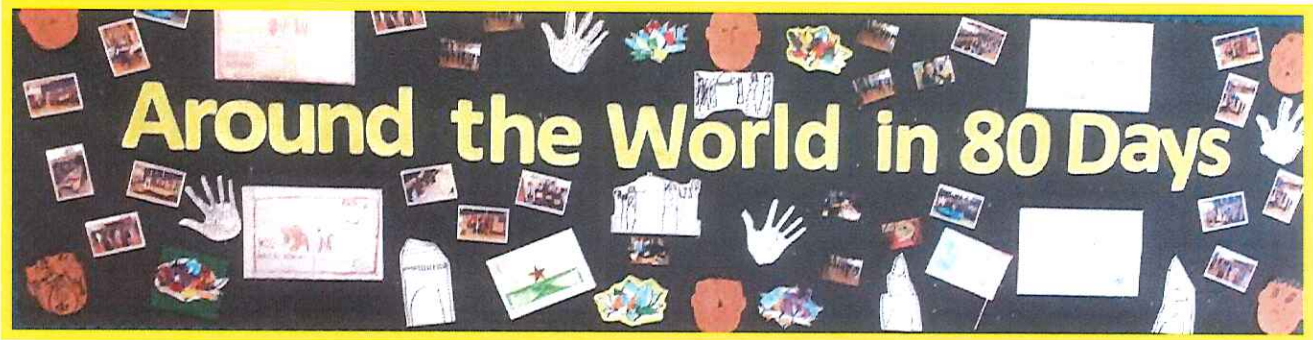


The children explored what a positive mind set is, applying it to scenarios both inside and outside of school. They explored the characteristics of Riley (a fictional animated character) and observed how she could change something negative into a positive experience with her proactive attitude and by using more positive and optimistic words. They then represented this in a Brain Diagram.



The children also considered the importance of feeling different emotions. Ollie discussed that you can't have JOY without SADNESS and that is why the character's hair is blue. Macy-Mae added that to appreciate JOY you needed to have felt SADNESS. All the children considered times when they had experienced the range of emotions in the film and discussed the difference between feeling emotions and acting upon them.



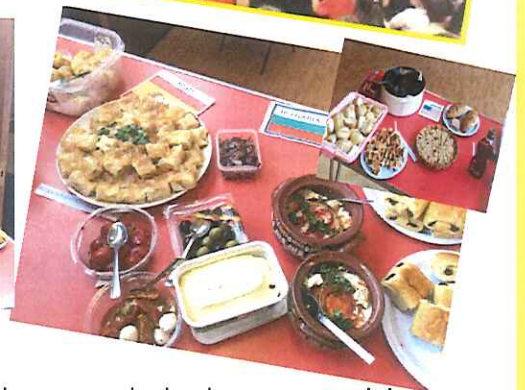
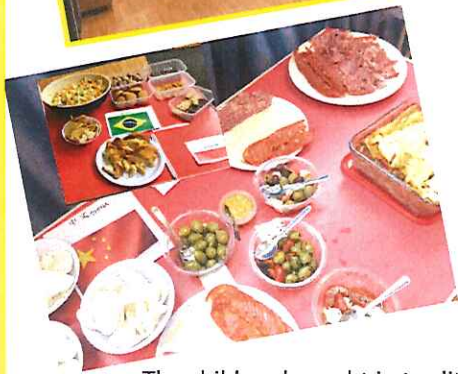


Opening Minds

Silver Birch: Alice (Y6) & Finley (Y4)

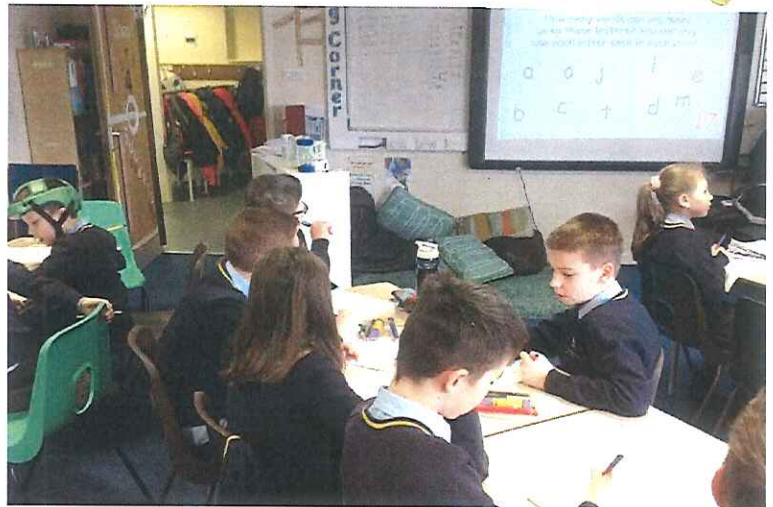
Pine: Miley (Y6) & Chloe (Y4)

At the end of the contest, the winners were Oak and the runners up were Sycamore; the reward for Oak was 300 house points and Sycamore earned 100 house points.

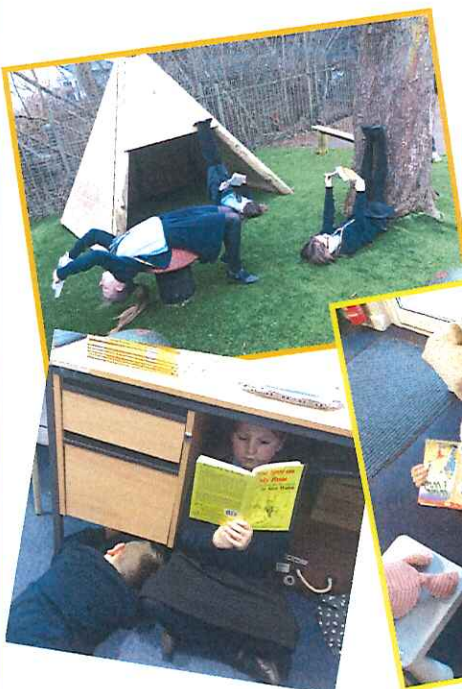
We took part in activities which included:

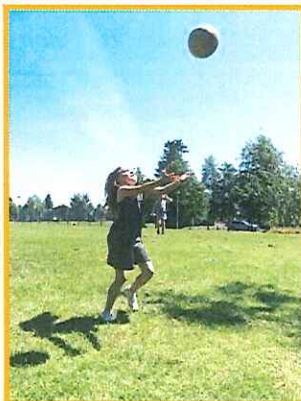

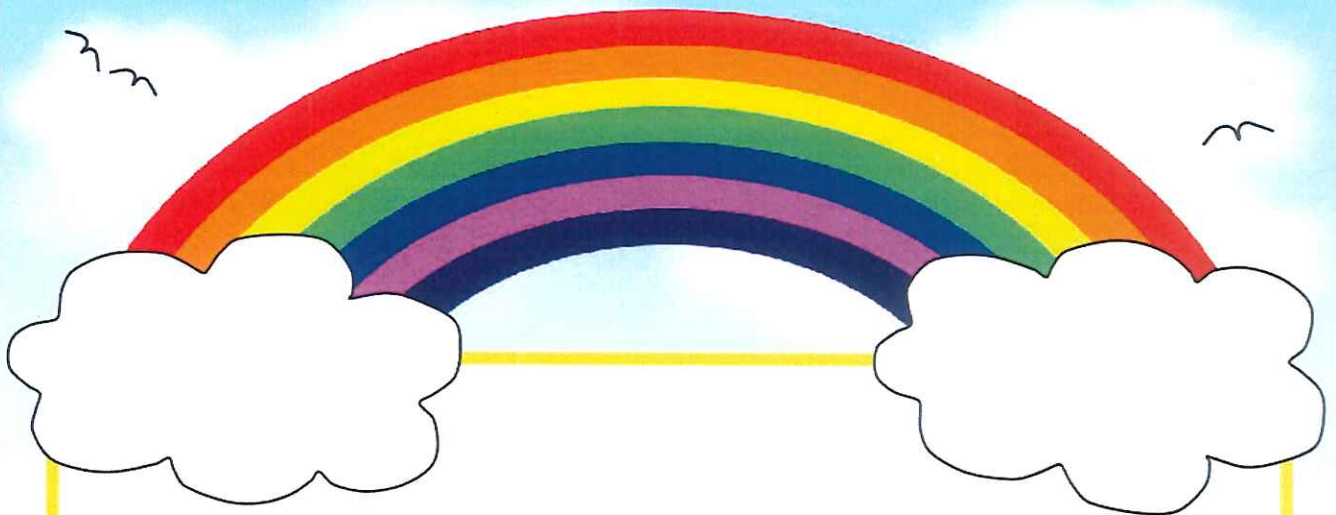
RECEPTION SEPTEMBER STARTERS GETTING READY FOR SCHOOL

It is not long now until September when we will be welcoming the newest members of our school to begin their exciting journey with us here at Kingstone and Thruxton Primary School.

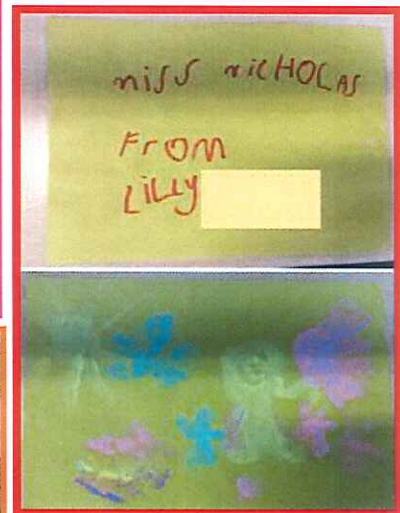
I, Miss Nicholas, am the Reception Class teacher and am so excited to get to meet you all again soon and learn more about you!

TOM - Emmet

This is an information text to explain who my hero, Tom Emmett is. I'd give you some background on him.

Tom was born in 1983 (he is now 31) and he is a MASSIVE Manchester United fan! As well as being generally a huge football fan to all clubs. What's unique about Tom is that he has the conditions, Spina bifida, and hydrocephalus, he has still played for Gloucester blazers, Cardiff City, Hereford. What's further more, he also set up a wheelchair netball team called the disableds, to support disabled people to get into sports.

Back Story

Tom was born disabled and in my opinion, he can't tell me how many operations he has had because he has lost count. When Tom was twelve he started and won gold in the 60" wheel chair dash and team hockey, also he is a pro in snooker and table tennis. Tom was among over 250 competitors in the national Junior games.

Later on in his life Tom built a special area with the dub Hereford FC for the disabled to come and get a ticket to see the game and get a bit view and generally help the disabled to get into sport, no matter what condition.

Why I look up to my hero!

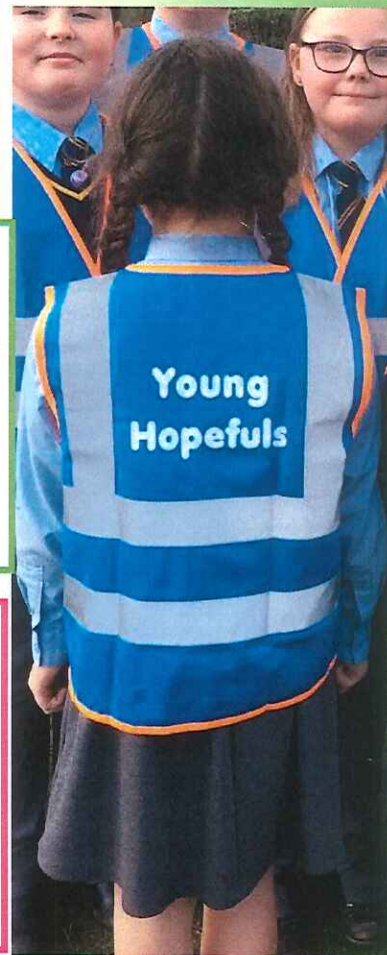

On Thursday 5th March, Mrs Preece took Sophie, Ollie and Joseph to the School Chef of the Year (SCOTY) finals in Stratford-Upon-Avon College.

The LACA (Lead Association for Caterers in Education) organised annual competition, sponsored by McDougalls, is a chance for school chefs to showcase their professional skills, in front of a panel of judges. Ten regional champions and two additional 'wild cards', battled against one another for the title. The Year 5 chefs had been invited to be guest judges because they had won a competition the previous year for their own cooking skills in a children's version of the competition.

Each chef had a maximum of £1.30 to spend and 90 minutes to prepare an imaginative, 'school compliant' two-course meal. The dishes needed to include at least one McDougalls' product each and be suitable for serving at lunchtimes in school to 11-year-olds.

Holly Charnock from Liverpool won the title. Her meal was: a main course of braised beef tortellini on a bed of soya bean and spinach, a tomato and basil sauce, balsamic reduction and parmesan crisp. For dessert she made a chocolate and beetroot brownie, served with banana ice cream, crumble and a raspberry and vanilla coulis. The pudding was certainly a hit with our judges! Would like that to be on the menu at KTPS? Congratulations and well done to our expert chefs for doing such a fantastic job on the day.
