Reception

All About Me!

Reception have settled into Kingstone beautifully, and have got fully stuck into their first school topic 'All About Me.' We have used this first half-term to get to know each other, make new friends and become familiar with the school routine. The Reception children have managed this so well and have been spotted around the school by a number of adults for being so polite, hard-working and grown-up!

Our Bodies

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We have been learning about ourselves and have been finding out about the wonderful things our bodies do. We have learnt that we all have a skeleton inside of our bodies that helps to protect our insides and to keep us upright. We know that we must keep our bodies healthy so they can work to their best ability, and this can be done by eating healthily and doing exercise. We have explored this by drawing around each other's bodies and labelling body parts. We have also experimented with running, hopping and jumping for a minute each to see how it makes our bodies feel.





We have also been getting active each week through lots of various activities in continuous provision, as well as learning some new parachute games with Miss Anthony.







Harvest

We have been learning about the Autumn Harvest and thinking about how thankful we are for all of the food that we have. We have learnt that some food can grow on trees or in the ground and that farmers harvest fruit, vegetables and crops using big machines called Combine Harvesters. We have even had a go at making our own vegetable soup to try all of the lovely food that farmers grow and sell to the Supermarkets. We peeled and cut a variety of vegetables, and put it in a pot to cook – it was delicious!





Jack Rutter

We were so lucky to have a Paralympic footballer, Jack Rutter, come and visit our school. He gave us an inspirational talk about following your dreams and carried out some circuit training for us. It was very hard work but so rewarding! We had lots of fun and had a great afternoon being active!



We have had such a brilliant time so far in Reception and we are only half a term in! Next half-term is full of fantastic festive fun, and I can't wait for you to find out what brilliant things we have in store!

Autumn in Year 1

We have had such a super start to our time in Year 1 and have all settled in so well! Our topic has been 'All About Me' and we have done lots of thinking about our interests, families and what makes us special and unique.

We have done some fantastic writing about our topic this half-term. We have written about the texts we have read and our topic learning. We particularly enjoyed writing about our story "Can't You Sleep, Little Bear?" by Martin Waddell. We made our own lanterns and furniture for a bear cave!

We loved taste testing different drinks and deciding what they were!






We had such a good time doing the circuits when Jack Rutter came to visit!














In art the children have been inspired by the African artist Edward Tingtinga who uses bold colours and patterns in his artwork.

Year 3

Year 3 have had a fantastic start to their time in Key Stage Two. We have really enjoyed our Science learning and have learnt so much about the human body and everything it needs to survive and thrive. We have identified muscle groups, classified food groups and researched everything we need to be healthy.



























Year 3 have been working on developing our team work and tactical skills across a number of different sports. We have looked at defending by closing the space and working to make the game difficult for attackers. We had a great time exploring different passing techniques in netball.

























Our art lessons this half-term have been so much fun. The adults in the classroom have been really impressed with the focus that the children have shown when developing their texture and shading skills. Our final landscape sketches have been completed to a brilliant standard.























We have really enjoyed our writing lessons this half-term. We have looked at the story of Stone Age Boy and written our own sequel. There have been some excellent stories that involve our Stone Age characters exploring the modern world and all the excitement that would create.







It has been lovely seeing how brilliantly everyone has come back to school after the summer. It is fabulous to have such a kind, hard working and friendly class—well done, Year 3!





Persuasive Letters to our favourite authors...

In writing sessions we have been honing our persuasive writing techniques. We have been writing to our favourite authors persuading them to get in touch and possibly visit our school. We all chose our own authors and we posted the letters all over the United Kingdom - a couple made their way to America! We visited the post box to post our letters. We were most surprised when, within a week, we had received a reply from Michaela Morgan. She told Kian that she was really impressed with his letter and said that she would like to visit our school. We are hoping to arrange a visit, or a Zoom call at the very least.



Place Value

In our Maths sessions we have been delving deeper into place value and have been challenging ourselves, looking at numbers over 1,000. We have used lots of concrete resources to support our working and have been using our knowledge to reason and problem solve. We have also been working hard on our times tables and have a weekly in class 'battle' on Times Table Rockstars— it gets very competitive!



The Victorians

Our History topic this half term has been the Victorians. We have learnt lots about the Industrial Revolution and spent time debating how different our life would be today if these inventions hadn't have happened. Many of us felt that the light bulb had has

the biggest impact, others felt the flushing toilet was a crucial invention.

We have learnt about the life of children in the Victorian era. Whilst not the same for all Victorian children, many of them had a very hard time working some tiring and dangerous jobs. We looked in detail at some of the jobs children (as young as 4) would have been expected to have: chimneysweep, coal miner, servant, factory worker.







Learning to play the clarinet...



For the last half term, we have been having weekly Music lessons through Encore Music Service.

Mrs Sherwood has been coming into school each week to teach us to play the clarinet. We have learnt how to assemble the clarinet, how to make a good sound with the correct embouchure and how to play a number of different notes. After half term we will begin looking at basic music notation and we are hoping to learn a little festive tune in time for Christmas. We cannot wait to share what we have learnt with you.



Gymnastics at Kingstone High School...

As well as our weekly netball sessions, we have also enjoyed a weekly gymnastics session at the High School this half term, led by Miss Wood. We have thoroughly enjoyed our sessions and have really impressed Miss Wood with our knowledge and skills.



Science: Animals, including Humans...

We have had so much fun in Science this half term. We have been learning all about the digestive system and about teeth. We created our own investigation to replicate food moving through our bodies and the various stages that it passes through. We have learnt lots of new vocabulary. We can explain the role that organs play in digestion. Ask us about our oesophagus, intestines,

stomach etc. We can tell you all you need to know. A nurse visited us to explain all about what happens if a part of someone's digestive system does not work quite as well as it should.



We have also been looking in detail at teeth - animal teeth and human teeth. We compared the teeth of herbivores and carnivores, concluding that their teeth are different because of their diets. We even got to look closely at the skull and teeth of a muntjac. We are able to name all of our teeth and explain the role that they play.



YEAR 5 - THE AMAZON

Art



The Year 5 children have been spending some time practicing their shading techniques (cross-hatching, stippling and scumbling) before applying these shades to their botanical sketches to show light and dark tones in colours.



Geography


Year 5 have been building on their map reading skills by locating the continent of South America on a map. They then located the Amazon rainforest. Why not ask them to recall some of the countries that the Amazon is within?

Science-Animals, including humans



Year 5 have been learning about the different milestones children achieve at different stages of their lives. We referred to lots of our personal experiences, especially younger siblings. We discussed that data is averaged and not all children achieve milestones at the same time.




English

In English lessons this half term, Year 6 have been

focusing on writing a Narrative based on the mini film and picture book: 'Varmints' by Mark Craste. We have been using the Jane Considene approach of sentence stacking and have drawn out some fantastic vocabulary using a range of experience days. First we discovered our own beauty spot on the school field and emerged ourselves in the sounds, smells, feels and experience of being outside, then we wanted to

ensure we had a great appreciation of nature and what it takes to make nature bloom so we planted new plants on our class balcony and are taking it in turns to ensure they thrive! Finally we then discussed the importance of friendship and how our relationships can also blossom just like our flowers if we treat them right with love, kindness and caring.

Maths

We have been learning about Place Value as well as recapping our key methods for addition and subtraction. We have been working on ways in which we can remember key information like using the rhyme: "If it's 5 or above, give it a shove. If it 4 or less, let it rest!" to help us remember what to do when rounding.

Science Lessons

Science lessons have been really fun this term!! We have been learning about animals including humans and focusing on the circulatory systems. This gave way to some pretty gross but awesome Science investigations... We got to make our own bloody replicas and even dissected a heart! We then used this knowledge to see how exercise effects the heart, put together a good fitness regime and then looked at the affect that poor choices, like diet and exercise, has on the body.



We used a bottle to represent the vein or artery in which blood travels around the body. We used yellow food dye in water to represent the plasma - water and protein. We then added red dyed cheerios for the red blood cells and mini marshmallows for white blood cells and finished by using hundreds and thousands for the platelets.









The children discussed the exercises we did with Jack Rutter and what affect they had on the body and how hard the heart needed to work to pump blood around the blood.



Photos on the left show Year 6 children in their heart dissection lesson. We investigated lamb's hearts to see all the features we have been learning about. We found 4 tubes that go into and out of the heart and labelled them the superior vena cava and the aorta. The superior vena cava is a vein that brings all of the blood from your upper body to your heart. There is also an inferior vena cava that brings blood from the lower half of your body. The aorta is an artery that takes blood from your heart and pumps it through back toward your body. We discussed that these are thick as they are dealing with a lot of force. We then discovered the two tubes without flaps which are the pulmonary veins and arteries. We discussed that first, blood comes in from the vena cava on the right ventricle, then gets pumped out the pulmonary artery. After getting oxygen, it returns through the pulmonary vein, and then back out to the body. We cut along the interventricular sulcus and lightly pulled the two parts so it opened like a book, and took a look inside. We noticed the four rooms of the heart. They match up with the two main arteries and veins we looked at, and are called atriums (top ones) and ventricles. We then compared the Ventricle Walls: one is much thicker than the other. In the left

ventricle, the heart has to contract to move blood throughout the whole body, so it has to have more muscle than the right, which brings blood a short distance to the lungs. We also discovered Chordae Tendinaes (the "heartstrings,") which pull on valves to open or close them.



This term we started Hot Chocolate with the Head. It is a really fun experience and you even get to meet children in other classes! You get to spend time with different people around the school and Mrs Vigus whilst you enjoy a hot chocolate treat! To get to attend, you need to have been given a Shoutout by a grown up in school. You will get a Shoutout for going 'above and beyond' for example, trying your hardest with all your work, or being extra kind to people around you. Every time you get a Shoutout (Friday to Friday), you get put in a special box and five children are drawn out in Friday's Celebration Assembly.

I was lucky enough to be picked out of the box in the very first week! It was very exciting to go, and I loved getting to meet Juno in Reception. We are allowed to choose squirty cream and marshmallows on our hot chocolate if we would like—I chose just marshmallows. It was absolutely delicious!

Year 6 Trip to the Mosque.

In Year 6, we have been lucky enough to go on a school trip to a Mosque in Gloucester called Masjid-e-Noor. We had a fantastic morning bringing RE alive!



When we went into the Mosque we had to take off our shoes. This is because the Mosque is a holy place and we don't want to bring in dirt from outside.





We had a go at using the wash room and practised the routine Muslims use before they pray. We had to wash our hands, face, arms up to elbows, top of your head and then your feet and ankles.





We learnt about the 'call to prayer'.

We also learnt about the board that shows the 5 times to pray and come to mosque each day. We also had the first verse of the Quran sang to us as part of a demonstration on how prayer is carried out.









The carpet was designed to look like lots of prayer mats.

We had the opportunity to try on some of the traditional dress worn by Muslims. We learnt not everybody wears outfits like this - people come to the Mosque wearing their everyday clothes too!



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




Elis, Year 3 has gained his swimming level 3 medal! Well done, Elis!



Fruit Rockets




