

Year 2 News




Year 3 Class Page

The class settled back into school quickly and have impressed all the Year 3 staff with their positive attitude and hard work.










The children carried out an investigation to explore the process of pollination.

We have had a different bunch of flowers in the class each week. The sunflowers were very popular.




In Forest School we used flint and steel to make fire.







Amazing cave art!










We had to hunt for 'food' in the bushes just like our hunter gatherer ancestors. We recorded our findings as we went.

In Science, we have been learning all about electricity this half term. We particularly enjoyed learning about electrical household errors and how to make circuits!











Our Wonderful Writing



In maths we have been challenging ourselves to make sure our place value knowledge is secure. One of our favourite parts of learning this term has been learning how to count backwards through 0. We played a game of tug of war where we needed to reach a target number before our partners! We love friendly competition!

We have been reading, 'The Explorer.' We would recommend this book to everyone - it had us gripping our seats the whole way through! All of our writing this half term has been linked to this book. We have written letters, character descriptions, predictions and newspaper reports.

Our Marvellous Maths

In maths we have been working on securing our place value knowledge. One of our favourite parts of this topic has been learning Roman Numerals up to 1,000. We learnt a song to help us. We found learning how the Roman number-system works really interesting. We even made Roman Numeral clocks.











Keeping Active



As well as working really hard in the classroom, we have had lots of opportunities to get out in the fresh air and keep active. As part of our Science topic, we went on a habitat hunt around the village.

In PE we have made the most of our lovely orchard and have been playing team games.







Science

In Science this half term we have been looking at the life-cycles of different animals and plants. As part of our topic, we were lucky enough to make apple juice. We looked at the life cycle of an apple and then collected our own, from the orchard, to make some juice.









As we are unable to sing in the classroom at the moment, we have been learning Makaton sign language. We are really enjoying it and are building up quite a repertoire. Head to our class page, on the website, to see us in action!





We had found out about the game of Pok-a-Tok in Topic. It was a ridiculously difficult ball game said to have been devised by the Ancient Mayan gods. The game involved two teams trying to score goals by getting a ball though a small hoop attached high up on a wall at each end of the court (usually in the grounds of a temple) but, as you couldn't use your hands or feet to touch the ball, it was extremely challenging to score at all. Games would last for hours - from sunrise to sunset - and the losing team would be sacrificed to the gods, so there was plenty of motivation to win!

Maths: We have been working on the place value and rounding of numbers, ranging from those with three decimal place digits to those worth hundreds of millions.

Each day we practice our arithmetic skills through 'Fluent in Five' - a set of five questions which cover all aspects of the four operations completed in 5 minutes. We are getting super speedy at calculating the answers!

We have also been using functional skills to calculate area and

perimeter.

Class Games: Three of our morning breaks are spent playing a whole class game. We vote for the game we would like to play: favourites include 40:40 Home and Hide and Seek. However, the parachute is the most popular activity because there are so many fun games you can use it for!

PSHE/Values: We enjoyed discussing the text 'The Boy, The Mole, The Fox and The Horse' by Charlie Mackesy. The book explores the 4 themes of: **Love, Bravery, Friendship and Kindness,** through inspirational drawings that reflect the relationships and experiences of the characters. We sent the author an email to say how much we had liked his book and he replied on the school's Twitter feed that he had seen our pictures and thought they were really good!

Despite recent restrictions, he continues to have music lessons with his tutor by using the online app Zoom.




Joseph is a natural imitator and can mimic the voices of characters brilliantly! It's no surprise that his ambition is to have a career in performing arts.

Poppy:

I thought it would be nerve-wracking but it was actually a cool experience talking to who would be my next Head Teacher when I get to high school! I asked about SEN provision because I know from my sister's experience how important getting enough support is.

Year 6 pupils Ben, Poppy, Holly and Tyler had a very interesting and exciting opportunity when they were chosen to represent the school on a Student Panel in order to put pupils' questions to the candidates who were interviewed for the post of Executive Head Teacher at Kingstone Academy Trust. There were four shortlisted applicants who were each given a tour of the primary school because, although Mrs Vigus is our Headteacher, the Executive Head will be responsible overall for Kingstone Academy Trust overall.

The children thought about what was important to them and their peers, putting together some very good questions; they took turns asking them, in an intense but enjoyable morning of interviews at the high school. Their feedback was helpful and provided a valuable insight from the pupils' perspective for the Governors making the decision about who to appoint.

Holly:



Tvler:



Everyone agreed that sharing the facilities would be something they would all like to continue doing in the future.




Our Learning Journeys...



- Add marshmallows; stir until completely melted.
- Stir in honey until blended. Pour over cereal mixture; stir until evenly coated.
- Cool for 5 minutes.
- Stir in M&M's and raisins; press into prepared pan using a greased spatula.
